So far we have investigated the geography of Antarctica, food webs, introduced species and territorial claims. We look forward to further learning opportunities including the exploration, current use, geology, the Antarctic Treaty and an in depth look at animal and plant life.



This week we studied the text, One Small Island by Alison Lester and Coral Tulloch.

Featuring Macquarie Island, this book demonstrates the historical effect humans have had on this isolated and now World Heritage Listed sub-Antarctic Island. Using incredible illustrations and facts this book describes the impact of sealers, explorers, introduced animals, environmentalists and the Australian Government. If anyone is interested in taking a look at this book it is available in the Primary Classroom. Miss Ellis has sourced some very exciting resources from the Australian Antarctic Division which will be freighted to the school very soon!

#### FRIENDS OF THE POUND

On Tuesday we had the pleasure of receiving a visit from two dedicated members of the non-profit organisation, Friends of the Pound Tweed Inc. This organisation has an important role in our community of



providing foster homes for unwanted cats and dogs until permanent homes can be located, improving conditions at the Tweed Pound and providing education on responsible pet ownership.

Accompanying the ladies was Clancy, a young and very lucky dog who has recently undergone eye surgery to correct cataracts. The cost of this expensive procedure to Friends of the Pound was \$5000.
